Unemployment Reflection Guide

Statistics:

As of March 2012, the unemployment rate in the US is 8.3%, meaning that there are 12.7 million people that are unemployed

- **o** Are these numbers surprising? Numbing?
- o 12.7 million people is the size of Pennsylvania, the 6th most populous state in the US. Does this help you think about the number?
- **o** How has unemployment touched your life?

U peaked in August of 2009 at 14.2%, and has since fallen to 9.0% in 2012. This is still .7% higher than the national average

- **o** How have you seen unemployment during your time at Calvin? In your service-learning experiences? Does it seem as though the rate has decreased since 2009?
- **o** The unemployment rate in Grand Rapids is 7.4%. Why do you think Grand Rapids has a lower rate than both the Michigan and the national average?

The national unemployment rate among African-Americans is 15.6%; nearly double the national average and that of Caucasians (8.7%)

- **o** What do you think might account for this difference? Is it significant or not?
- o As Christians, how should we respond to numbers such as these?
- **o** The unemployment rate among Hispanics and Latinos is 12.5%. Again, what might account for these higher rates among minorities?
- **o** How might a high unemployment rate within a minority community affect the culture of that community?

These statistics measure the number of jobs as a fraction of the labor force. The labor force is a group defined by people who have actively looked for a job in the last 4 weeks.

- **o** How might these numbers above change if those who have become discouraged and stopped looking for work were counted?
- **o** Do you see any problems with the way unemployment is measured? What might be a better method?
